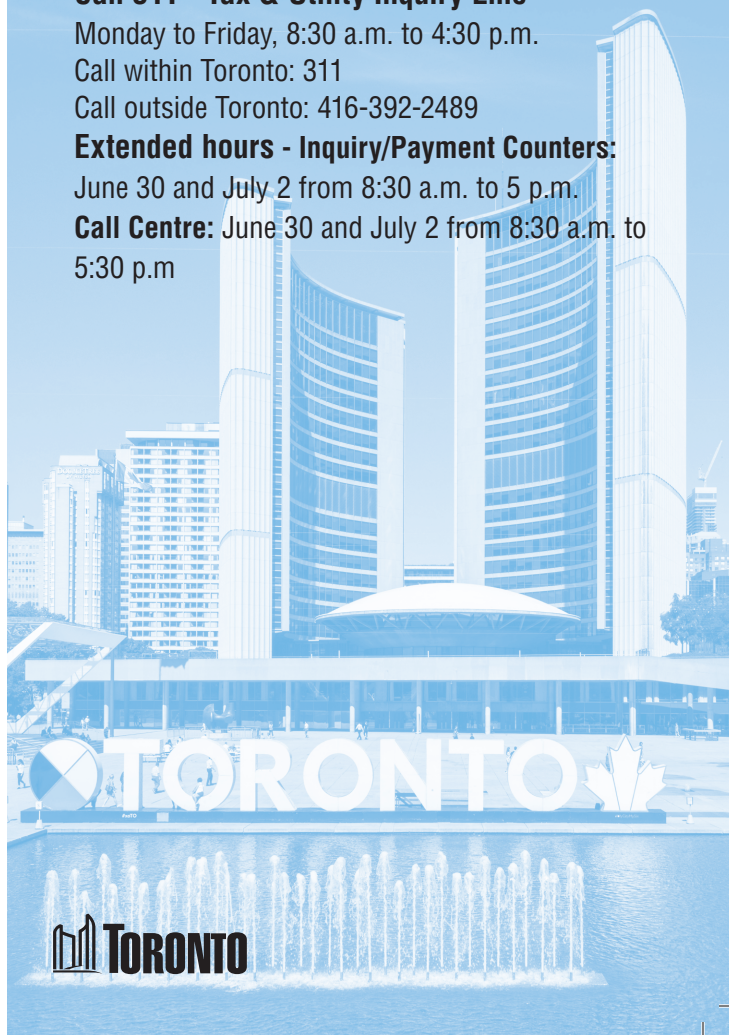

## Final 2026 property tax bill

Your final property tax bill is the second of two regular tax bills sent in 2026. The interim tax bill was mailed in January. The final 2026 property taxes are comprised of a municipal and education levy. The municipal portion is calculated by multiplying your property's fully phased-in January 1, 2016 current value assessment (CVA) by the municipal tax rate, as approved by City Council. The education component is calculated by multiplying your property's fully phased-in current value assessment (CVA) by the education tax rate, as set by the Government of Ontario. Properties in the commercial, industrial and multi-residential tax classes may be subject to further adjustments to determine final taxes. The Government of Ontario postponed the 2021 reassessment; 2026 property values are the same current value assessment (CVA) values as 2020, unless the property experienced relevant changes (improvements or demolitions).

## Relief programs

The City offers the following relief programs for eligible property owners:

### Property Tax, Water and Solid Waste Relief

For low-income seniors and low-income persons with disabilities who own a residential property.

### Co-Operative Housing Grant Program

Available to eligible persons residing in non-profit housing co-operatives.

### Cancellation, Reduction or Refund of Taxes

For owners of properties that undergo changes during the year (i.e. change in property class, building demolished or undergoing repairs or renovations).

### Charity Rebates

For registered charities occupying property space in a commercial or industrial building.

## Vacant Home Tax Program

If you own a house or condo in Toronto, you need to let the City know if it is occupied or vacant by making a declaration every year — even if you live at your property. The goal of the program is to increase the supply of housing by encouraging owners of vacant residential properties to sell them or rent them out. The declaration period for the 2026 calendar year opens at the beginning of November 2026. Learn more: [toronto.ca/VacantHomeTax](https://toronto.ca/VacantHomeTax).

## Your 2026 City tax dollars at work

For a home with an assessed value of \$692,140, the total City taxes would be \$4,252\* (excluding education taxes in the amount of \$1,059\*). Here's how your City tax dollars will be spent:

- \$814 Transit
- \$789 Police Services, Fire and Paramedic Services
- \$481 Cost Shared Social Programs
- \$460 Financing
- \$403 Fire and Paramedic Services
- \$399 Governance & Corporate Services
- \$373 Other Agencies
- \$366 Other City Operations
- \$167 Transportation Services
- \$4,252\* Total (\*numbers rounded)**

Note: The program costs identified above are based on average assessed values and are not per household costs.
